## This Week at MWS

In this column we'll let you know about what's happening in our school class by class. For this week here's the news.

**Parent/Child:** Parents will continue to master their knitting skills while children enjoy a morning of play, snack, and story.

**Morning Glory:** Michelle's children are venturing a bit farther on their walks. They will be playing, singing, and enjoying millet rolls this week!

**Appleblossom:** Marie's children will be making a very special Valentine this week. They will have a Valentine circle and hear the further adventures of Peter the Gnome.

**Sunflower:** Lynn's children are sewing Valentine hearts this week. They will also enjoy a Valentine-themed circle.

**First Grade:** Mrs. Myers' student recently met three math helpers: a wizard who is very good at seeing patterns, a plump gnome who likes nothing better than to gather things up, and her lean cousin who can't seem to keep her toes on the ground. The students received new flutes and are making special felted cases for them.

**Second Grade:** Mrs. Henry's students are in a language arts block and hearing fables. New and longer words are being introduced but the students are pleased with the ever-growing list they are making of words they know by heart. The class is busy with preparations for the play.

**Third Grade:** Mr. Price's students are in an arithmetic block. They have discovered that when you know how to line numbers up, and have learned the fundamentals of borrowing and carrying you can add or subtract even the biggest numbers. Mr. Price just finished reading *The Wheel on the School* and now the class is enjoying a Monadnock Waldorf School favorite: *Farmer Boy*.

**Fourth Grade:** Mrs. Zakrzewski's students are in a language arts block hearing the stories of the Norse gods of Valhalla and their fierce battles. The students have begun fashioning shields in woodworking and designing the form-drawing that will adorn them. The class will visit Kroka this week. The students want everyone to know that they have lost a total of 207 teeth since the first day of first grade!

**Fifth Grade:** Miss Marshall's students are working with the decimal point. Sometimes it can be moved easily without too much thinking and other times it has stu-

dents scratching their heads and working very hard. The class is hearing stories of the Greek gods and goddesses. Don't be alarmed if you hear yelling and moaning coming from the classroom. It's only the class practicing the play, a Greek tragedy.

**Sixth Grade:** Mr. McGuigan's students continue their study of the Roman period around the year 540. They have traveled as far as Anglitterre. They will remain in the same time frame but shift their studies to the establishment of Islam and the life of the prophet Mohammed. Thanks to all who donated 66 items to the Community Kitchen last week. The class asks that we try to double that—one item for every elementary school student. If we keep that pace, we will be able to deliver over 1000 non-perishable items to the kitchen before year's end.

**Seventh Grade:** Mrs. Motter's students are undertaking a study of chemistry—a study of interactions and transformations. The students have recently completed a thoroughly rigorous form-drawing block.

**Eighth Grade:** Ms. Morse's students are using part of every Main Lesson to study their play, William Shakespeare's *As You Like It*. (Have you marked your calendars for Friday and Saturday, April 9 and 10? The play is recommended for students of all ages.) The class is studying Asia and was lucky enough to have a visit with Mrs. Ahn to learn about her life growing up in a rural South Korean farming village.

**Ninth Grade** The ninth graders spent the first 3 weeks of January at the Waldorf School of Saratoga Springs, where students experienced a full high school, grades 9 - 12, met many new friends, were present to hear their HS alumni come back to speak about their college experience after Waldorf and studied Thermodynamics with Michael D'Aleo. A few of our boys were part of a class team that scored high for designing a simple stove that was quick to make boiling water out of an ice cube. Presently, English is focusing on Anne Frank and John Anderson's history block is coming to a close. Students are studying Apartheid, colonialization and the Holocaust as they explore these challenging relationships between races and countries. Katie Schwerin has returned with puppetry with plans for an end of year performance.

## *Reflections on Michelle Brooks Talk on Calm and Caring Bedtime Routines*

On a cold but sunny morning in early January, several families joined Apple Blossom Kindergarten teacher, Michelle Brooks, for a morning dedicated to creating more peace and ritual when attending to the bedtime routine for our children.

The morning began with reading from a handout. A chapter entitled Sleeping and Waking, written by Margaret Meyerkort, describing the importance of morning and evening in the overall scope of the day. In essence, there is a pause, which can hold the possibility of preparation for the day ahead, or in the evening, provide healing and in a way, digestion of all that our day brought forth. These transition times have powerful effects upon us and "it is as if we stand before a doorway and hold two parts of our lives in balance." When we wake, it is our soul meeting the earth and the surroundings of the material world; at bedtime, we rest our sense organs and turn inward, towards the spiritual world.

After our reading, Michelle spoke of her own experience as a mother of three teen-aged children. Michelle shared her appreciation of the bedtime ritual, and also, her tips and suggestions when a child faces more difficulty making the transition to sleep. We paired up and shared in some massage on the hands and also pressure on the back, arms and legs. Massage can be particularly helpful in helping children release from their impressions and stimulation of the day. A father of a child who has a more difficult time with the shift from waking to sleeping shared that often his child asks for the pressure to be harder as he squeezes down her arms and legs. The morning continued with several people sharing experiences, struggles, ideas, thoughts and support. Michelle offered useful suggestions such as the use of a hot water bottle to warm the bed, lighting a candle, used just for bedtime, in your child's room, and for young children, limiting bedtime stories to avoid overstimulation as these images are carried into the sleep life. We learned that although lights out may be 7 P.M., the transition to bedtime is happening for some time before, in order for our little one's body to be ready for rest. As a group, we continued the sharing while keeping our hands busy each completing a water bottle cover that Michelle had started.

The morning passed by quickly, it seemed, but with a sense that no matter what one's family bedtime routine may look like now, inevitably it will change. This workshop began the conversation of, as one father in attendance shared, bringing an intention and conscious purpose to this task as parents. All to sleep must go, after all; and so, sweet dreams.
