In this column we'll let you know about what's happening in our school class by class. For this week here's the news.

Parent/Child Program: New sessions begin this week. Parents will share their thoughts with each other while their little ones play, enjoy a snack, and take a walk outside.

Morning Glory: Michelle's children will be playing inside and out this week and will be looking for signs of spring on their morning walks.

Appleblossom: Marie's children will be marching around at circle time like big giants. They will hear the story *The Snow Man* and then enjoy the story as a puppet show later in the week. They will be making new bird feeders for ones that squirrel-nutkin took away!

Sunflower: Lynn's children will welcome the giant Rommelgood to their circle. They will also hear the story *The Snow Man* and enjoy a puppet show later in the week. They will put taps in the trees this week and begin collecting sap for maple sugar.

Think of all of the delicious dishes you can make with the eggs: French Toast, Quiche, Scrambled Eggs (yummy with cheese for a quick dinner), Fritata and many more.

Need Another Compelling Reason to Consider a Waldorf High School?

Read the first three chapters of Meredith Hall's memoir *Without a Map*. Chapters One and Two tell of Hall's unplanned pregnancy at age sixteen in small town New Hampshire in 1965, and her subsequent (and appalling) shunning by school, church, friends, and family.

Chapter Three is justly entitled "Respite", and is a moving account of Hall's senior year at High Mowing Waldorf High School in Wilton, the only high school in the state that would accept her after the birth and adoption of the baby. Despite being placed in a single dorm room (so that she would not be "tempted" to reveal her secret), Hall's deep depression is alleviated by the spoken and unspoken compassion of faculty and staff, a compassion that is deeply rooted in the spiritual underpinnings of the school's philosophy, daily life, and festivals.

There is also respite of another kind: Hall's encounter with a master teacher and her excitement at truly learning, truly engaging in her studies for the first time in her life. She is not doing it for the sake of good grades or teacher approval or future career, but for the sake of the learning itself, and for the sake of her own life and soul.

So hie thee to a Waldorf High School Open House (hey, there's a Waldorf High School right here in Keene! You don't even have to go to Wilton!). Then finish reading this beautiful and wrenching book!
